## New books in our library:

***The Beautiful Soul of John Woolman, Apostle of Abolition***—Thomas P.

Slaughter. This penetrating biography shows how this Quaker mystic transformed into a prophetic figure. His preaching against slavery, forced labor, war taxes, and consumerism was infused with a benign confidence that ordinary people could achieve spiritual perfection, and this goodness gave his message persuasive power and enduring influence.

***New Jim Crow, Mass Incarceration***—

Michelle Alexander. Alexander argues persuasively that “we” have not ended racial caste in America; “we” have merely redesigned it. Jim Crow and legal racial segregation has been replaced by mass incarceration as a system of social control.

***A Testament of Devotion***—Thomas

Kelly. By the renowned Quaker teacher Thomas Kelly. Plainspoken and deeply inspirational, it urges us to center our lives on God's presence, to find quiet and stillness within modern life, and to discover the deeply satisfying and lasting peace of the inner spiritual journey.

***Invention of Wings***—Sue Monk Kidd.

This bestselling novel is based on the life of Sarah Grimké, 19th-century abolitionist and women's rights pioneer. The action is set in motion on Sarah's eleventh birthday, when she is given ownership of ten-year-old Handful, who is to be her handmaid. We follow their remarkable journeys through thirty-five years, as both strive for a life of their own, dramatically shaping each other's destinies and forming a relationship marked by guilt, defiance, estrangement and the uneasy ways of love.
