A proposed booklist for our spring **book study group** is here:

***Being Mortal* by Atul Gawande.** In this book Gawande, a practicing surgeon, describes aging, mortality, dying and death, current practices and how they may change to our advantage... or disadvantage.

***Healing the Heart of Democracy* by Parker Palmer** helps us, "We the People of this country," to learn to practice politics from the heart. By coming from a loving perspective, the reader begins to live within the tensions of differences and conflict instead of focusing on an "us versus them" attitude.

***Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates** is a bold and personal literary exploration of America's racial history. It offers a powerful new framework for understanding our nation's history and current crisis.

***A Sustainable Life: Quaker Faith and Practice in the Renewal of Creation* by Douglas Gwyn.** How have Quakers learned to create the kind of life that can prepare us to live fully and responsibly in a time of social and planetary change?

***The Quaker Way: A Rediscovery* by Rex Ambler.** This book is an attempt 'to explain the Quaker way, as far as that is possible'.
