The Peace and Justice committee is continuing **a weekly protest** to show that we strongly oppose the treatment of immigrants at the border, especially the inhumanity of separating children from their parents. Protests are each Friday, from noon to 1 pm, in front of the Wash Co courthouse on College Ave in Fayetteville. Protests will continue through the end of the year.

Quaker Statement on Immigration Policies (adopted October 6, 2019)

Upholding the Quaker principles of equality and community, the Fayetteville Quaker Meeting is speaking out in opposition to the inhumanity of current US immigration policies and practices.

At our southern border, the primary port of entry, the US government separates children from their families and imprisons them in critically dangerous conditions. Enduring extrajudicial detention, children and adults alike are deprived of adequate food, water, shelter, sleep, cleanliness and medical attention. These practices fly in the face of prohibiting court orders with impunity. All the while, corporations reap billions of dollars from the abuse.

The United States is one of the nations most responsible for the economic, environmental and social issues that force immigration: American corporations exploit land and labor in Central America; our administration responds to climate change with profiteering, militarization, and denial of human rights, and continues to rollback the regulations that would mitigate the crisis that lays bare once fertile, lifesupporting farmlands; further, the US supports totalitarian regimes responsible for life-threatening social and economic conditions.

We decry the escalating violence and brutality that immigrants must endure upon setting foot on our shores. Our administration militarizes our borders against individuals seeking asylum from the very conditions it has engendered. We demand that our legislators stand up and speak out now for human rights, and undertake the development of well considered policies that correct the issues that force our brothers and sisters to flee their homelands.
